



"Would you like there to be a different king?" he asked Guy.

Southfields Pumpkin Soup

Ingredients

- 1 butternut pumpkin, peeled de-seeded and cubed
- 1 large potato, peeled and cubed
- 1 Jarge carret, peeled and roughly chopped
- 1 onion, diced
- 2 thsp ofive oil
- 4 thsp chicken stock powder

Method

Heat cil in a pan and fry all vegetables until golden.

Add 2L boiling water to the pan and stir in stock powder.

Bring to the boil and simmer for 20 minutes until all vegetables are soft.

Using a stick mixer liquely all the soup until it's nice and smooth.

Taste and season with salt and popper accordingly.

WHERE DOES HALLOWEEN COME FROM?



We celebrate Halloween every year on October 31st. Where does the holiday come from?

The holiday originally comes from a people called the Celts. The Celts lived in Europe more than 2000 years ago. On November 1st they celebrated the end of summer. They thought ghosts visited the living on October 31st. They dressed up like ghosts so the spirits would not harm them.
