## British rowers marooned on Norwegian island

A group of rowers, all from the UK are said to be happy and healthy in spite of being trapped on a Norwegian island for 8 days. The men, including Olympian Alex Gregory, say they do not expect to be rescued for another week.

The group sought refuge on the small island of Jan Mayen on 19 August, a month after starting their expedition from Norway to Iceland. In nine days, the crew completed the 521 nautical miles and achieved eight world records. On 7 August, the group began the next part of their expedition, and three days later they reached the Arctic sea ice. Soon after, the weather became cloudy, after five days of no sun the boat's solar-powered batteries ran out. Eight days after leaving Svalbard, the power had stopped all electrical equipment from working. The crew had to resort to manual steering and without navigational aids decided to head towards the island of Jan Mayen - 370 miles (600 km) from Iceland.

Asked when they will be able to return home, Alex said a boat visiting the island next week is the most likely possibility.

## Plastic bags now illegal in Kenya

A complete ban on plastic bags has come into action in Kenya, this now means that anyone found selling, producing or carrying them could face fines of up to around £20,000 or even be sent to prison.

The government says the ban will help environment. protect the companies who make the bags have argued that many jobs could be lost.

On Friday, a court rejected a challenge to the ban. People in Kenya are thought to use about 25 million bags a month. A number of other countries have outlawed plastic carrier bags, including Rwanda and Eritrea.

The spectacular 1.7 mile Queensferry Bridge will replace the Forth Road Bridge as the main road route between Edinburgh and Fife.
