At Southfields we strive to create an environment where children can develop intellectually, emotionally, socially, physically and morally. We endeavour to enrich the curriculum for our children by offering a wide range of learning both within and outside the classroom. We work hard to provide a first class broad education that offers many opportunities.

We live in a country that leads in business, culture and technological innovation. We believe that to maintain this world position we need to equip our pupils with the fundamental skills in mathematics, English, STEM and computing, but understand that they can only realise their talents by accessing and participating in the creative arts, music, drama and dance. The breadth of the creative curriculum allows children to grow in personal confidence and competence to lead successful, purposeful and fulfilling lives, contributing actively to the world they live in.

The staff work hard to provide a bespoke curriculum which is split into year groups where pupils access age appropriate materials and experiences. Our curriculum is designed specifically for Southfields pupils considering their interests, gaps in learning or experiences as well as providing opportunities to develop good learning behaviours. At Southfields we aim to foster 'Learning for Life', providing a curriculum that inspires a lifelong love of learning and equips our pupils with the key knowledge and understanding, skills and personal qualities they will need to thrive in a rapidly changing world.

As part of this we are committed to developing a growth mindset, encouraging learning behaviours that support this. Children need to be prepared for an ever-changing world. The teaching of mindsets builds resilience, a desire to learn, to challenge themselves and to encourage others – all of which are necessary for children's future success. The teaching of growth mindsets has had a huge impact in our school: it has raised standards, built resilience and created a culture of collaborative learning.

We are committed to providing many extended school opportunities - with over 30 clubs as well as many family events. We believe that educational visits and residential trips are an important part of learning. They provide excellent opportunities for children to learn first-hand about the wider world and its history.

Southfields teaches creativity and expression. We believe in the value of teaching the arts and think it is essential to provide memorable experiences for our pupils.

The arts provide unique pathways to learning which we fully embrace and have over many years. We have child-led learning opportunities within the school where all pupils regularly use the arts to inspire independent learning, for instance in the 'Morphus and Nonsense' shop where pupils are inspired to use a variety of artefacts to inspire mark making and creativity, as well as explore the power of words and imagination through the arts.

This is also evidenced in living books where pupils become characters within stories such as 'Flower Fairies Dancing in a Mid-Summer Night Garden' or acting out 'the boy in the striped pyjamas' across the fencing of our Anderson Shelter.

Forest school and eco work is inspired by wellington trees, bug hotels and also 'catching a moment' rain droplets showing the magic of learning here and in the Sudan on our global Arts project through Connecting Classrooms. A quiet paisley art garden for meditation develops philosophy allowing pupils time to think and reflect on the world we live in.

The school embraces the arts which is evident in the internal and external environment of the school.

Early cave man mark-making paintings, aboriginal burial poles, internal cafes to promote modern foreign languages even lunch times embrace the arts where we link foods and art work inspired by fruit and vegetables. Pianos are dotted around the school and all pupils learn to play five tuned instruments and read musical notation; we believe this improves work and standards in mathematics. Dance provides amazing memorable experiences in science. The arts underpins most of the curriculum and we fully use its magic to ensure our pupils have vibrant and interesting education.

At Southfields we value and embrace the similarities and differences of cultures around the world. We have worked hard over many years to ensure that pupils develop an understanding of different cultures and we have used the arts to compare similarities and differences, for instance in our whole school project on landscapes where we considered how different countries interpret their own landscape.

Memories of school educational trips are among the most prominent of the formative years, largely because it is a time when pupils and teachers are able to explore the curriculum in a way that is not possible on the school site. While their purpose is essentially to educate, they can also be a fun bonding experience for everyone involved.

Educational trips, visits and experiences reinforce as well as inspire pupils learning. They provide the opportunity to socialise on a different level and expose the pupils to worlds beyond their own. The children learn the importance of curiosity, engagement, challenge beyond what they already know as well as providing new insights into other peoples' passions and interests.

Residential visits provide many benefits to gain new perspectives on the world. This is especially true when pupils travel further away from home as they become directly in contact with a different environments, new cultures and dialects, pupils can better understand their place in the community and develop an openness to differences in others.

Educational trips provide an opportunity for total immersion in the natural environment and social setting. Pupils practise their social skills and critical thinking abilities outside of the controlled class setting. Being able to ask experts about their particular area of study on the spot requires thinking. They are able to learn real-world lessons.

Examples of these visits, trips, residential and events include: Fineshade Woods, Farms and Zoos, Marine Parks, Dinosaur Park, Sculpture Parks, Railways, Historical Reenactment Villages such as Stibbington Evacuation, Black Country Museum, Hampton Court Palace Yorvik Centre, Historical London, Museums, art galleries, theatres, visiting famous historical monuments, outdoor adventure, re-enactments linked to books such as Harry Potter and the Gruffalo, contrasting localities such as the beach, local cities, boat trips, space centres and planetariums, contrasting geographical environments such as the Living Rainforest, Spy Missions and Safety Challenge to name a few.

All of these visits enhance and provide a depth of learning beyond the school to provide amazing experiences for our pupils.

Science is essential as it enables young people to develop their understanding of scientific concepts and make sense of the world around them. It develops transferable skills including problem-solving, reasoning and enquiry.

At Southfields Primary we do all we can to ensure science teaching inspires primary pupils. We have designed an exciting curriculum based on practical aspects of science with links to everyday life. Our 'Big Questions' inspire pupils to want to find out more using many transferable skills including teamwork, collaboration, discussion, turn talking, problem solving, making links to prior learning and experiences, reasoning and using careful observations, following lines of enquiry and documenting their findings to share them beyond their own understanding.

Science is a core subject at Southfields and we have worked hard on our curriculum, planning, equipment, resources as well as up-skilling teachers and staff to deliver a first-class science lesson. We spend at least two hours per week on science and also link science into other areas of the curriculum to support and encourage pupils to have a natural curiosity about the world around them, as well as develop good understanding and knowledge to support them in the future.

Our high-quality physical education curriculum inspires all pupils to succeed and excel in sports both competitive and non-competitive. It provides opportunities for pupils to become physically confident in a way that supports their health and fitness. Opportunities to compete in sport and other activities builds character and helps to embed values such as fairness, teamwork, individual best, practise and respect.

Our curriculum offers a range of different sports delivered by both teachers as well as coaches and specialist sports teachers. We have a strong link with the local secondary sports college and also work alongside the Regional College in dance and drama.

We are proud of our gymnastics team, who have competed in both regional and also national competitions. We also take part in many football, netball, tennis, cricket and swimming tournaments. We are also proud to have our own swimming pool and miniature golf course.

At Southfields we believe in the magic of learning. Due to this we have developed a creative and experiential learning curriculum, full of exciting hands on opportunities that are fun for children to take part in and learn from.

We benefit from a wonderful environment, inside and out, that the children use on a daily basis to enhance their learning. Inside our extensive building, the pupils have access to a multimedia Apple suite, Music room, International Cafe, Morphus and Nonsense Shop (for creative writing inspiration), two large main halls including a stage with full sound and lighting, a costume and props room, dining room, sensory room, library, museum and dedicated SEND resource room. In addition to this, we have a large welfare area including meeting and soft furnished rooms for the counsellor's use. Throughout the school we also have break out areas for teaching and learning.

All children across the school take part in Morphus and Nonsense days, where they take ownership of their own learning. Children are given the time and resources to create a piece of work of their choosing using the skills that they have learnt in the classroom. During these days, pupils have access to all areas within the school, including our facilities inside and out of the building. Pupils can present their work in any format, evidence of which is displayed by the teachers.

Children from throughout the school also take part in Enrichment activities each week. We have allocated two hours each week for children to take part in a range of activities to develop their experiences as well as to embed and apply basic skills and this includes sessions on: European culture; English Heritage; World Geography; Financial Capabilities; First Aid; Music; Forest Schools; Art and Design; Library studies; Graphic Design; Global Community; Cookery; Dance; Cycling proficiency; Drama; Sewing and Fair Trade as well as practical basic skills enabling them to apply these skills to real life.

In addition to Enrichment activities, Year 6 pupils take part in Magpie. This is an experimental learning experience to support and develop writing to support pupils as they move towards their end of year SATs and Secondary School. These sessions are lead by Mrs Martin, Mrs King and Mrs Payne and includes a trip to the rainforest, exploration of the Arctic, writing their own lyrics and publishing their very first books.

Our school provides an outstanding environment for our pupils to learn and prosper. We take great pride in the sustainability work that we have completed to date and this can be seen throughout our grounds. We have our own environmental area, sensory garden, allotments, forest schools area, pond, willow classroom, meditation garden, caravans with fire pit, mud kitchens, Anderson Shelter and wild life areas.

The pupils take responsibility for growing their own produce and selling this from our 'Sustainable Barn' to parents and carers throughout different points in the year.

In addition to the sustainable and environmental aspects in our outdoors, we also benefit from a range of other areas. Our children have two football pitches, three netball courts, three playgrounds, an outdoor Victorian classroom, trim trail, climbing wall, art sculptures, Tudor house, knight's training camp, crooked tree house, secret garden, Gingerbread story shed, story telling chair, multi-faith maze, Angry Birds SMSC area, dinosaur park, construction site, pirate ship, Peter Rabbit's garden, picnic areas and our own outdoor swimming pool.

Throughout the year the children take part in caring for the amazing environment that we have, learning how to grow vegetables from seeds and investigating the world around them including inspecting our very own Bug Hotel. With the help of our Eco Team we are able to maintain our beautiful environment and encourage all children to support us in all elements of this.

Each year we take part in the Peterborough Eco Awards, working towards creating a more sustainable future for our children and community. We have been lucky enough to win several awards each year, including the Eco School Student Choice Award for two years running.

Pupil Support and Pastoral Care

We have a large welfare team who work with children and families across the school. Pupils may work with the team individually, in pairs or groups. The support groups we offer are: friendship, talk time, anger management, advice and specific case-related personal support. We also have positive parenting classes and welfare drop-in sessions for parents. We have weekly meetings about welfare and parents should inform the school at the earliest time if their child needs support at home or school. We also have a trained counsellor whom children can access: please speak to the Welfare team for more information.

HUB of expertise for Speech and Language

We have a HUB of expertise for Speech and Language which children access across the school site. This provision supports pupils with speech and language difficulties through the use of highly trained teaching assistants who teach programmes and work closely alongside speech and language therapists and occupational health therapists to support pupils in progressing.

Special Educational Needs and Disabilities

Pupils with Special Educational Needs are helped within the normal classroom environment in addition to being supported to work on individual programmes with additional trained staff. Our SEND team work closely with educational psychologists and other agencies who may support children where appropriate (The policy for Special Educational Needs and Disability is available if you would like more information please refer to our SEND section on the school website). Our SEND co-ordinator is also happy to speak to you about general issues related to Special Educational Needs if the class teacher can not answer your questions.

Admissions

For the academic year 2018-19 administration of admission arrangements to community schools has been taken over by the Local Authority (LA) to be dealt with centrally. This reflects existing arrangements for admission to secondary schools. The children will be allocated their place and parents will be asked to complete a number of forms that will follow their child throughout the school. As a three-form entry school we will have 90 places available each academic year in our Reception class. Although we currently have substantial waiting lists in each year group, these waiting lists can be viewed on our website.

The School Day

Doors open at 8:40am for KS2 and 8:45am in EYFS and KS1. Both Key Stages also have a 15 minute morning break at the teachers' discretion.

Absences

If your child is absent through sickness or any unavoidable cause, please inform the school by telephone in the first instance. This absence constitutes an authorised absence. A note will be required from you on the child's return.

We appreciate that all family circumstances are different but we want children to be in school as much as possible. Absences during term time can seriously disrupt the continuity of learning. The school must collect and report details of absences by law and so all absence levels are monitored closely.

Clubs

At Southfields we host a variety of clubs (over 30) and extra curricular activities that pupils can get involved with. Letters will be sent home providing children with all of the options at the beginning of each term.

Home and Online Learning

Each year group across the school will set home learning for the children to complete outside of school. This will include reading, spellings and mathematics practice in addition to a weekly journal activity. In addition to this, all of the children have access to a variety of online learning platforms that they can access from home. All username and password information will be sent home in your child's school diary.

Events

We welcome parents and carers into school on many occasions throughout the year. Pupils all take part in showcases or performances, which parents are invited to come and watch. Alongside this, we hold regular workshops for parents on how to support your child at home, invite parents in for breakfast/lunch, host curriculum evenings, musical and sports events, craft and art events and celebration evenings. We also have a Healthy Schools committee and PTA who also run a variety of events throughout the year.

Uniform

Here at Southfields Primary School, we have a school uniform.
