## Natterhub's Online Safety Guides for parents and carers



Whether we like it or not, screens are integral part of everyone's daily lives - including those of our children.

Some of the statistics can seem worrying. According to research carried out by Ofcom in 2019, 9 out of 10 primary school aged children regularly use a device to go online. A quarter of children have at least one social media profile by the age of 10, with the most popular apps including WhatsApp, Facebook, Snapchat and Instagram. These sites can also bring with them the risk of pressure from social peers, or the possibility of being contacted by strangers, though virtual bullying is not as prevalent for many as face-to-face incidents. It's no wonder that only 55% of parents who were asked said that the benefits of being online outweighed the risks. But Natterhub want to change that!
